Running... by Cheryl Parisi

Running is something I do for the joy of it. I had never really considered running to race. So when a friend suggested a ½ marathon in Washington DC in March I was very hesitant. After all, I had never run more than six miles and that was only once. My usual runs average 3-5 miles.

Training for a ½ marathon is usually 9-12 weeks. A training schedule of 11 weeks was created. Training was outdoors, early morning starting last week of December and went through the first week of March. Thank goodness we had a mild winter! As the training progressed, I became more comfortable with longer distances which I ran on Saturday mornings.

The week of the race finally arrived. We went down to Washington DC on Friday, March 8th to check in and pick up our bibs and few souvenirs (shirt, sweatshirt, etc). I was given a few suggestions that I followed – go the end of the water stations and never run through a water station.

The race is called The United Airlines Rock n Roll Marathon, ½ Marathon, 5K. Music is everywhere. My goal was to run 10 minute miles. It was a cold morning in Washington DC and by the time the race started my feet were freezing. It took two miles for my hands and feet to warm up. But I kept telling myself to relax, just run the way you trained, 10 minute miles.

As long as I made it past mile 6, a long, steep, uphill, I would be okay. Mile 6 was lined with photos of men and women who had made the ultimate sacrifice for our country as well as 50 or more American flags at the top of the hill. It was very inspirational and just what I needed to get to the top. Bands every other mile was amazing. Fraternities and sororities in Georgetown handing out beer along the route was interesting. As I reached Mile 10 I could see the Capital Building the entire mile. What a great site. As I neared the finish line, I knew I was better than my goal of 10 minutes per mile. My finish time was 2:07:43 (overall average of 9:45 a mile). I was beyond happy that I had accomplished my goal. It was 10:56 am when I crossed the finish line.

As I went to call home, my phone died! I didn't find out that I had won my age group (65-69) until 2:00 pm when I called home from the hotel. I had registered my husband, daughter and sons email addresses and they could follow me at Miles 3, 6, 10 and the finish line. They knew I had won. I was soooo excited! It was such a great feeling.

I have run the Main Street Mile twice, once finishing in third place and the second time finishing in first place (65-69). I also recently ran the Ho Ho Ho Run in Bethpage two weeks before Christmas coming in first place. This was a 5K (3.21 miles) race and I came in first place in my age group running an 8:41 mile.

When I started the training, I wasn't sure that I would be able to run 13.1 miles. But as the training continued and I ran longer and longer I became more and more sure that even if I had to walk a portion of the race, I would finish. And finish I did!


BOOK CLUB


